Skeen: Good Evening, Council. We have a Special Use Permit for 414 Cedar Street. The zoning is R-3, so it does not require a buffer. It is a old commercial building, it's a doctor's office that they were going to turn into multi-family. They didn't get that far and they are part-time living here and part-time in Florida, so they want to rent out as a short-term rental, part of that space.

So, you can see on Cedar Street, it's got the blue star on there. This is the aerial of the building. You can see the driveway is about 100' so they have plenty of off-street parking. And then this is the front of the house and a side view, when it pops up, so.

We do have representatives from their leasing agents so if they have any question, if you have any questions, they're here to answer your questions. Okay.

Mary Helen Reinarman: Inaudible.

Lamb: We will call you up in just a second.

Skeen: Any questions?

Hagedorn: Questions from the Council? Discussion? It's a Public Hearing folks, so if you would like to come up, please speak into the microphone, state your name and your address please.

Mary Helen Reinarman: Sorry about that, hi, my name is Mary Helen Reinarman, I actually live in the house my family moved into in 1964, it's right across the street one house down and I'm definitely opposed to that. We already have issues with parking. I love Tilted Skillet and the street festivals. You're going to have, they are not going to mean to. You're going to have issues at night with loud noises after weddings or funerals or class reunions. Besides that it could have affect the issues that you got with the brick house on at Elm Street, no on Third Street. And then on Elm Street, you have Old Dutch Tavern, up on Fifth Street *inaudible* old home is a short-term rental. You already have ample short-term rentals and hotels. It could take from them.

Then also, you're taking housing market off of the rental property. There's already a crisis with the rental property. So, no, I'm definitely opposed to that.

Skeen: Well, to address the rental, they wouldn't rent long-term since they plan to be here six months out of the year, at least. So, they would continue living in the house part-time.

Mary Helen Reinarman: And if there are issues then, do we go directly to them? I don't want to inundate the Police Officers with things like that, they have enough to do. Will we contact the owners, will we contact a person at the City?

Skeen: And they have a representative from their leasing company...

Mary Helen Reinarman: They do? And would that representative then have their phone number available so if there are issues like after hours, like...

Skeen: You could ask them, they are here.

Nat Hammond: Within reason yes.

Klekamp: I'm sorry, can you please come up to the microphone?

Hagedorn: Hold on. **Lamb:** Hold on, ma'am. **Piontek:** One at a time.

Mary Helen Reinarman: I'm done, I already stated what I needed to state, but thank you.

Hagedorn: Thank you. **Nat Hammond:** *Inaudible*

Skeen: Yes, please.

Nat Hammond: Hi, my name is Nat Hammond. I'm with Missouri Haus, I live at 680 Scenic View Drive in Union. So, one of the things I wanted to mention that to kind of speak to some of the issues is.

One of the things we do with all of our vacation rentals is we use a device called a minute device or sound monitoring device. Doesn't record noise, it only records decibels. We will get an alert if it goes above let's say, 80 decibels, which is kind of, let's say light to fair dinner conversation. As far as the level of decibels, it also has the ability to pick up a smoke whether it be from cigarettes or marijuana smoke. Obviously, that wouldn't be an issue for neighbors, it would be smoking inside.

It also monitors the amount of devices that are in the home. So, if you have a lot of people and they, let's say there's 14 people there and there's 30 cell phone devices, we're obviously going to know about that.

There is ample off-street parking and unlike most of the other lodging options within Downtown Washington, actually, I don't think there is any, this one has appeals to people with mobility issues. It has a wheelchair ramp, it has a special bathroom, actually two of them I think for people who have mobility issues.

This is something that is greatly needed in Washington for lodging. So, this is going to help families out that are coming to the area that people might be wheelchair bound. There's not a lot of lodging options for that where people can come and congregate in the home, share a meal, play games, spend time with family.

That's pretty much all I can give you. Any questions?

Patke: The lady mentioned about a phone number to reach someone on. Is that posted or is that some where they can, how's that addressed, if there is an issue?

Nat Hammond: If there's an issue, well first of all, there's going to be any noise issues, we're going to know about it because we're going to get an alert before any of these guys get it. You know, if there's, you know again, if it goes above, I think was it 86 decibels, roughly?

Unknown: Yeah, between 80 and 90.

Nat Hammond: Between 80 and 90 decibels, we're going to get an alert and then we are going to text the guest, warn them that they need to bring it down. If it doesn't go away after 10 minutes, we are probably going to show up, let them know they need to bring it down and they're going to have to vacate the premises.

Fortunately, we've only had two incidents in the entire area since we've started doing this and one of them was a couple in Marthasville, so, after a wedding.

Hidritch: And that just reads inside the house?

Nat Hammond: I'm sorry?

Hidritch: And that just reads inside the house?

Nat Hammond: Yes, it reads noise.

Hidritch: It does not do anything outside?

Nat Hammond: It can and we probably will put one out there too. So, what happens is if you have, if you have people outside and they're loud, obnoxious, we're going to get notifications for that. We do have that at another house in Downtown Washington. So, if we get noise above 86 decibels, let's say at 11:00 at night, we're going to get an alert on it and we're going to contact them.

Patke: So, kind of self-policing for that matter.

Nat Hammond: I'm sorry?

Patke: Self-policing for that matter for a lot of that. I didn't realize that you guys had that kind of monitoring systems.

Nat Hammond: I wanted to actually mention that before in previous situations where I've come, but it is something I've done presentations on it. But the latest technology, and there's multiple companies that do it and we have to put that in our listing. But what they do is they monitor like sound levels and you know, and the latest thing is that we'll also monitor smoke and marijuana smoke.

Outside it's not as big of a deal and it's okay if people do that. You know, it's Missouri we can't you know, we can't restrict that but at least we can protect the home itself. But I think the nice thing is it monitors sound and it also monitors the amount of devices that you know, we can tell how many people are in the house. So, we'll get a list it's like we know the TVs, know the you know, the thermostat things like that. But when we start getting cell phones and then let's say there's 30 unrecognizable cell phones and you're only supposed to have five people in there, we're going to know something's going on.

Patke: Sure.

Hagedorn: Other question...

Nat Hammond: Oh, the phone number. They can certainly look us up on-line, I'm certainly going to pass out my cards around to some of the people that might have any questions. We certainly want to you know, make friends of the neighbors rather than, you know, keep them at odds because the thing is at some point one of their family members might want to come in town and stay there, especially if it's somebody that's like a grandmother that can't get up the stairs. It's going to be a perfect opportunity for them to come and visit with family but have their own space.

Hagedorn: Okay, thank you. **Nat Hammond:** Thank you.

Hagedorn: Other comments from the audience? Okay.

* Review of Code Changes- Chapter 420 Stormwater Management Standards

RE: Section 420 Stormwater Management Standards – Code Revisions

Dear Mayor and City Council Members:

Please find enclosed proposed code revisions for Section 420 Stormwater Management Standards. These code changes were reviewed at the February and May Planning and Zoning Meetings.

These code modifications come as a result of DNR's findings on non-compliance with MS4 regulations. The modifications will help bring the City into compliance and improve the quality of stormwater runoff making into our local waterways. The major changes DNR needed to see were in Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination, Construction Site Stormwater Runoff Control, and Post-Construction Stormwater Management. We handled the Construction Site Runoff through adding specific language about grade/land disturbance permits. This added to the code more specific requirements for the permit as well as site monitoring both by the site developers and the City. The Post-Construction Control is in the section with Flood Control as many of the Post-construction will be similar in nature to flood control measures utilizing detention basins but adding in water quality standards that must be met. Lastly, was adding in Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination measures adding guidelines for what are acceptable stormwater discharges and what the procedures are for eliminating and enforcement of the code for when illicit discharges occur.

I have attached a redlined version that shows the existing codes and new proposed codes in red. The existing codes were unchanged for the most part with these new requirements added. These changes have been reviewed by City Staff, Stormwater Committee, and DNR and recommend for your approval.

Stankovic: Good Evening, Council. So, before you is Section 420 Stormwater Management Code Revisions. This comes as a result of DNR's audit that they did finding non-compliance with our MS4 Regulations.

So, the three main areas that we changed we're addressing Illicit Discharge, Construction Site Runoff, and Post Construction Stormwater Management Systems which those Post Construction Stormwater Management Systems are, it's not just covering flood control anymore now it's covering water quality as well with that.

The Construction Site Runoff, we're handling through the Grading Permit adding extra regulations. Really spelling out what the Grading Permit is and the SWPPP Inspections that the contractor and developers will have to do.

And Illicit Discharge covers what's in Illicit Discharge and then all of these have enhanced enforcement regulations and steps that would be taken if not followed. Questions?

Lamb: Do you want to mention how this affects our MS4?

Stankovic: Yes, so our MS4, so, we're they found us you know, not, DNR found us not in compliance of these areas, so, this helps bring us into some of the compliance. There's a lot of other stuff we need to do with our MS4 as far as Public Outreach and different things. And then enforcing these codes is a big part of that as well.

DNR reviewed these, they're good with all the code changes. This was reviewed at our Stormwater Committee and we have a couple different people involved, Councilmembers that all reviewed these changes as well.

Patke: And a couple developers as well are on board.

Stankovic: Yes.

Patke: So, my question was just, how much of a different, how much of an additional restraint is it to a developer on just a normal everyday, you know, water runoff?

Stankovic: I think, the construction runoff, they should be addressing that already.

Patke: Right.

Stankovic: So, it's really just putting enforcements in place and stuff on our end for regulating that. The biggest thing they'll see is the Post Construction Water Quality side of this. They'll have to treat the whole sites, you know, it's the first, it's not all the water, but it's in there. It's like the 90% rainfall discharges have to be treated for water quality and run through a different Stormwater Management System, not just a basin. There'll be some additional costs with that.

Patke: Okay. Stankovic: Sure.

Hagedorn: Other questions you guys? I'll take a motion to accept it into the minutes.

Klekamp: It's a Public Hearing.

Hagedorn: Public Hearing, sorry. Would anyone like to comment on our stormwater regs revision? Okay.

* Review of Code Changes – 425 Fire Hydrants and Connections

RE: Section 425 Fire Hydrants and Connections – Code Revisions

Dear Mayor and City Council Members:

Please find enclosed proposed code revisions for Section 425 Fire Hydrants and Connections. These were presented at the May Planning and Zoning Meeting. These code

modifications come as a result of the newly adopted International Building and Fire Codes on January 1st 2024. These adopted codes contradicted some of the City ordinances for fire hydrant spacing. As a result much of the revised code reference the Fire Code and better address fire hydrant spacing based on the needed flow. This should overall reduce the amount of fire hydrants for developers while ensuring proper fire flow in the hydrants which is crucial to fire fighting operations. Staff also added sections in the code to address the hydrant paint colors and who is responsible for flow testing and painting of new hydrants. Lastly fire lanes were addressed. Information about fire lanes is scattered throughout other sections of the code. Now as far as design and construction of fire lanes, it is all spelled out in this one section. These were the overall changes as well as minor adjustments made to Section 425. These revisions were reviewed by multiple departments including Public Works, Fire Department, Building, and Engineering and recommend for approval.

We also addressed some of the other changes in the International Fire Code, which had to do with the fire lanes. The widths, striping, signs, that sort of thing and then cleaned up some other verbiage in the code there.

Re: E-Scooter Request

Dear Mayor and City Council Members:

For your consideration, this letter, with the attached proposal from Jesse Turner is a summary of the Traffic Committee's conversation on the topic.

On May 3, 2024 the Traffic Committee was briefed by Jesse Turner in reference to his request to enter into an agreement with the City to provide E-Scooters under similar conditions to our previous arrangement with Lime. Mr. Turner indicated that his goal would be to provide several pick/drop off locations in the downtown area along with the city park. Mr. Turner informed the committee that the scooters, which are made by Levy Electric include a required application for checkout that also requires riders to bring the scooters back to specific locations prior to ending a ride. The committee discussed the details of the safeguards and agreements that were previously in place between the City and Lime during their contract to ensure that Mr. Turner was able to accommodate all of the same criterial. Below is a summary of those items:

- 1. Scooters not to operate between 10pm and 5am.
- 2. Sooters not allowed in festival districts. This was accomplished using the scooters GPS and geofencing features.
- 3. Photo ID required to start a ride to ensure valid driver's license.
- 4. No scooters allowed South of Mo 100. Also no operation along 5th Street. Scooters can operate across 5th Street.
- 5. Reduced speed of 10mph on park trail systems.

- 6. Insurance- Mr. Turner indicated that the scooters carry liability coverages of 2 million per incident and 4 million aggregate. Turner indicated that he could have the city named as an additional insured on the policy just as Lime had.
- 7. Profit Sharing Mr. Turner agreed to the same cost sharing agreement that Lime had which was 5 cents per trip or a minimum of \$200 monthly. He had also discussed interest on his part in installing charging infrastructure at the pickup and drop off locations. He proposed that the equipment would be installed at his cost and that he would pay for the electric. Under that scenario, Turner indicated that he would be willing to share an additional 10% with the city on top of the share mentioned above.
- 8. Property Damage- The group discussed past property damage issues involving rental scooters and noted that towards the end of the contract with Lime a fund had been created to recoup some of the city's losses for man hours, etc. in the cleaning up graffiti caused by tire marks. As a remedy to that concern, Mr. Turner indicated that he would be willing to take responsibility for cleanup of that type of property damage.

The majority of the committee members were neutral on the concept that Mr. Turner had proposed, however ultimately an unopposed vote was made to send the item to City Council for review providing that all of the above criteria are met as part of a potential new MOU.
